Weekend voter registration drive hits Kolar district

A special two-day voter registration drive will be conducted across Kolar district on September 19 and 20 to ensure complete enrollment of eligible youth and first-time voters, announced Deputy Commissioner and District Election Officer M.R. Ravikumar on Friday. Booth Level Officers (BLOs) will be stationed across all 1,578 polling stations throughout the weekend to assist residents. Addressing recognized political party representatives at his office, Ravikumar urged party agents and citizens to cooperate in finalizing an error-free voter roll under the ongoing Special Intensive Revision of Electoral Rolls-2026, set to the qualifying date of October 1, 2026. Eligible voters can submit Form 6 for fresh additions, Form 7 for deletions, and Form 8 for corrections or residence updates until September 23 through booth officers or official online portals. The draft electoral roll published on August 24 recorded 11,24,231 registered voters across six Assembly segments, comprising

CLEANLINESS BEYOND DUTY

‘Swachhata Hi Seva-2026’ campaign launched

Cleanliness must transcend routine government obligations to become an everyday personal habit for every citizen, stated Fauzia Tarannum B., Commissioner of the Rural Drinking Water and Sanitation Department, Bengaluru. She inaugurated the fortnight-long ‘Swachhata Hi Seva-2026’ special campaign at K. Shettahalli Gram Panchayat in Srirangapatna taluk.

Addressing the gathering, the Commissioner stressed that the initiative—running from September 17 to October 2 across Mandya district—must cultivate a sustainable culture of environmental hygiene throughout rural Karnataka. She urged households to practice source segregation by composting wet waste locally and transferring dry recyclables such as plastic, metal, and glass—to panchayat collection vehicles. She noted that solid and plastic waste units, fecal sludge

treatment plants, and Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs) are converting waste into valuable resources at the grassroots level. Calling for dignity and respect toward sanitation workers, the Commissioner reminded residents that individuals bear prime accountability for the waste they produce. Emphasizing the link between environmental cleanliness, public wellness, and children's physical growth, she urged school students, youth groups, teachers, ASHA and Anganwadi

workers, and women's self-help groups (SHGs) to lead the sanitation movement. During the program, Zilla Panchayat Chief Executive Officer K.R. Nandini administered the official cleanliness pledge, rallying the community toward resource conservation and public health. Organizers highlighted menstrual hygiene awareness drives that promote reusable menstrual cups among rural women through trained grassroots health workers and SHGs.

Vijayendra slams state govt in Shikaripura rally

Vijayendra challenged DK Shivakumar on stalled welfare, power crises, drought, and Western Ghats fears under Kasturirangan report

Launching a scathing attack on the state administration, BJP State President B.Y. Vijayendra characterized the current regime as hostile toward farmers, the poor, youth, and women. Addressing a rally in front of the Taluk Office following a protest march demanding an adequate agricultural electricity supply, Vijayendra warned that rural resentment could soon boil over. Targeting District In-charge Minister Madhu Bangarappa, Vijayendra challenged Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar on his maiden district tour to examine whether the ruling party had delivered on even a single key election promise. He alleged that severe power shortages have left lakes dry

and crippled rural livelihoods, noting that schemes such as Ganga Kalyana, housing allocations, and disability pensions have stalled across the state over the past three years. He also pointed out that communities along the Western Ghats continue to live under apprehension due to the Kasturirangan report. Echoing these criticisms, Shivamogga MP B.Y. Raghavendra termed the administration an "empty vessel," pointing out that while the government pledged six hours of agricultural three-phase power, farmers barely receive two hours daily. Raghavendra challenged Bangarappa to compare developmental records between Shikaripura and Soraba, highlighting major irrigation works and title deed distribu-



tions undertaken during former Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa's tenure while questioning why milk procurement rates have not been increased to support distressed farmers. Adding to the offensive, State BJP Vice President Halappa Harathalu accused the leadership of being disconnected from rural realities. He alleged that government focus remains restricted to revenue-generating corridors

surrounding Bengaluru, while local ministers shirk administrative responsibility instead of securing vital irrigation power for Malnad and central Karnataka districts.

Farmers stage protest demanding completion of road work

Activists from the Karnataka Rajya Raitha Sangha and Hasisu Sene staged a demonstration in front of the local Tahsildar's office on Friday, demanding the immediate completion of the pending Rukmapura-Bavinahalli road construction. Addressing the gathering, Taluk President Hanamantaraya Chandalapura expressed outrage that the vital road work remains unfinished despite two years having elapsed since its inception. He explained that after laying the initial layers of kankar and murrum gravel mix, authorities abruptly halted further construction. This prolonged delay has rendered vehicular travel hazardous and caused severe hardships for local residents. The heavy clouds of dust kicked up by daily traffic have coated residences, ruined household items, contaminated food, and triggered respiratory and other health issues among villagers living alongside the corridor. The association warned the administration that if the Public Works Department fails to finish the asphalt work immediately, an intensified agitation will be launched outside the department's offices. Following the demonstration, leaders submitted a formal memorandum addressed to the Assistant Executive Engineer of the Public Works Department through the Tahsildar's office staff. Prominent leaders participating in the protest included Hunasagi Taluk Honorary President Saheb Gowda Madalinganal, District Vice President Tippanna Jampa, Hunasagi Taluk President Hanuma Gowda Narayanapur, Surapura Taluk Honorary President Mallanna Halabavi.

Mandya Court sentences POC SO convict to 20 years in jail

The Second Fast Track Special Court in Mandya has sentenced 50-year-old Nagesh to 20 years of rigorous imprisonment and imposed a fine of ₹1,10,000 for sexually assaulting a minor girl. According to the prosecution, the convict, a resident of Modajakanaahalli in Mandya taluk, subjected the minor victim to sustained intimidation, blackmailed her with false rumors to silence her, and repeatedly assaulted her, which resulted in her pregnancy prior to December 29, 2025. Following a complaint, Shivalli police registered a case under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act. Investigating Officer Manjunatha A., Circle Inspector of Keragodu, completed the probe and submitted the charge sheet. Delivering the verdict on September 17, Special Judge B. Dileep Kumar found the accused guilty. Special Public Prosecutor Hebbakavadi Nagaraju represented the state.

DC directs multi-agency push for TB-free Gram Panchayats

Concrete measures must be initiated to transform every village local body in the district into a tuberculosis-free Gram Panchayat in a phased manner, instructed Deputy Commissioner Dr. Kumar on Friday. Presiding over the district-level TB Forum review meeting held at his office, Dr. Kumar directed health authorities and civic bodies to prioritize the early detection of suspected tuberculosis cases and ensure immediate medical intervention. He underscored that early diagnosis remains pivotal to curbing transmission and securing successful clinical outcomes across rural belts. Addressing treatment protocols, Dr. Kumar stressed that care must extend beyond clinical prescriptions to encompass compassionate psycho-social support. Healthcare teams must provide dedicated counseling to patients and their households, debunking persistent social stigmas while emphasizing rigorous adherence to prescribed drug regimens without interruption. Field workers were told to conduct close, continuous monitoring so that no patient defaults midway through their course. The Deputy Commissioner instructed health workers and panchayat functionaries to coordinate door-to-door screenings to identify symptomatic individuals for prompt sputum and diagnostic testing. Furthermore, he mandated the uninterrupted distribution of government nutritional assistance alongside primary medications to help patients rebuild physical immunity during recovery. Dr. Kumar emphasized that eliminating tuberculosis remains a top government priority requiring cohesive

‘Land conversion mandatory for commercial use’

Authorities cannot grant licenses for commercial activities in unauthorized buildings lacking mandatory planning permits, clarified Deputy Commissioner Dr. Kumara on Friday. Presiding over a review on registering new homestay applications with the Tourism Department, he asserted that statutory land conversion remains compulsory before running commercial ventures on agricultural plots. Dr. Kumara warned that farmhouses permitted strictly for agricultural operations must not be misused for commercial hospitality, residential layouts, or real estate developments under the guise of farming. Directing interdepartmental coordination to curb illegal developments, he ordered immediate legal proceedings against non-compliant properties. Sub-Divisional Officer Shivamurthy and Tourism Deputy Director Raghavendra attended the session alongside local homestay applicants.
